



### **President's Report**

Like last year, 2021 has brought its share of challenges to the club as well as each of our members individually. Lockdowns interrupted football activities in February, May/June, and again in July. The lockdown starting in early August ultimately led to the cancellation of the season, resulting in no league premiers, no relegation, and no promotion.

Football has been an important part of our members' lives throughout the pandemic, providing opportunities to socialise and engage in physical activity. Thank you to all the volunteer coaches and committee members who've contributed to the club this year. It's been a challenging year made more difficult by not having the reward of being able to play much football. To everyone who has done anything to keep their clubmates connected and engaged during these trying times, thank you.

Responding to changing COVID-19 restrictions has been a challenging exercise for the volunteers who run MUSC. Each time the Government's directions changed, the club needed to wait for and then digest the advice from DHHS, Sport & Recreation Victoria, Football Victoria, City of Melbourne, and the University of Melbourne. The club's COVIDSafe plan would need updating and approving by council before we could continue activities at Princes Park. Thank you and well done to all coaches, players and supporters for abiding by the various restrictions in place throughout the year and adjusting your activities to make the best of the situation.

COVID-19 has slowed progress on some club initiatives. The time spent on COVID safety protocols has taken focus off other projects. The inability for the Board, committees or groups of coaches to meet in person has all had an impact. Not being able to interact with as many people in person around the club or inside the clubrooms has made it harder for leaders to engage and train volunteers and therefore delegate tasks.

Overall membership numbers have not dropped off from the 2019 season. We had been planning to add a seventh women's team in 2021 but unfortunately ended up withdrawing one team due to a lack of players in pre-season. Hopefully the prospect of a relatively uninterrupted 2022 season, the excitement of an upcoming World Cup on home soil, and the return of students to on-campus learning at the University will see these numbers bounce back and then grow.

While the season was disrupted and ultimately cancelled, there were still lots of positives in 2021. Six or seven of our 19 teams were in serious contention to win their league at the time the season was cancelled. Nic Vincent played her 200th game for the club and life member Harry Gill clocked up the amazing achievement of 700 games for MUSC. Off-field highlights for the year included:

- Constitution amendments being approved by the membership and ratified by Consumer Affairs. This was a significant project of the Board throughout 2020 and provides the foundations for the club to now be able to work towards its vision of being Australia's leading university soccer club.
- Expansion of the Club Administrator role into a position for a properly contracted part-time employee with HR and payroll support provided by Melbourne Uni Sport, and the appointment of Kim Littlejohn to that role.

- Purchase of a Veo Sports Camera, which provides the club's coaches with video analysis capabilities and allows the club to share match highlights online.
- Launch of our new club logo; a project that has been in the works for several years.
- Winning the Club Leadership Award at the UniSport Australia Awards and being a finalist for Community Sporting Organisation of the Year at the Pride in Sport Awards. Well done to the club's Pride Ambassador, Cat Hoang, and everyone who has contributed to initiatives and the culture of the club to make it the inclusive club it is today. The awards are a great recognition of the values and contributions of many good club people over many years.
- Delivering the All Gender Games Series, providing participation opportunities to players who may be excluded during the regular season due to being trans or gender diverse.
- Launch of a new online store through our teamwear supplier This Is Football.
- Introducing a Point Of Sale solution for the Northern Pavilion canteen & bar, allowing the club to better reconcile sales and reduce opportunities for financial mismanagement.
- Progress on some new reconciliation initiatives that will launch in 2022.

Thank you to our 2021 shirt sponsors Robinson Gill Lawyers, TC Real Estate and The Malt Social, and our player of the match award sponsor, New York Minute.

Thank you to Melbourne University Sport for their continued and tremendous support of the club, and also to the City of Melbourne's Recreation Services team.

A massive thank you to my fellow Board members, our dedicated committee chairs, and our club administrators for all their contributions throughout the year.

Victoria's current vaccination uptake and reopening roadmap provide optimism that a more normal season will be possible in 2022. Next year will be the club's 75th anniversary and will also see the club celebrate 40 years of women's football. The club has some exciting initiatives and celebrations planned. I look forward to seeing our members and supporters around the club in 2022.



# **Membership Statistics**

In 2021, the Club had a total of 370 members:

- 352 playing members (includes player-coaches)
- 8 non-playing members (volunteer coaches & committee members)
- 10 life members (who were not also registered as players)

The following graphs relate to data about playing members only.



The proportion of members playing in women's teams is down from 34% in 2019. The proportion of members who are current University of Melbourne students is down slightly from 42% in 2019.

An additional 397 expressions of interest were received by the Club throughout the year. Of those EOIs, 140 (35%) were from women (79 UoM students) and 257 (65%) were from men (126 UoM students). Most do not go on to trial or train with the Club.

### **Gender Equity & Equality**

Football is a traditionally male-dominated sport. An initial gender audit of a few key areas of the club is summarised below. It establishes baseline data from which the Board will be able to assess progress made in relation to gender equity and equality at the Club, and identify areas of improvement.

#### **Board & Committee Composition**

At the 2020 AGM, members approved changes to the Constitution to increase the number of Directors from seven to eight and allow for a gender-balanced Board. For the first time, the Club currently has a full Board with 50:50 representation of players from its men's teams and women's teams.

The Board's four executive roles are split evenly amongst men and women. There is an even split between men's and women's team players in the club's key leadership positions (officers or committee chairs). The Board will ensure more adequate representation of women's team players on the Matchday Committee in 2022.

#### **Facilities**


In 2021, 24% of the Club's players were in women's teams. This section of the playing group was apportioned 37% of the Club's overall Princes Park allocation for training.

Each women's team player had access to 2 training sessions per week. On average, each men's team player had access to 1.2 training sessions per week. All 19 of the Club's teams played their home matches at Princes Park.

More club resources are spent on ground hire for the Men's State League teams in preseason. These squads commence pre-season earlier than other teams at the Club because their competitions typically start a month earlier than all others.

#### Social Media

Analysis of the Club's Facebook posts for the past three years (2019-2021) shows the Club's posts just slightly favour content solely relating to men or men's teams over content solely relating to women or women's teams. This fairly even split has been achieved without the Club having a formal policy stipulating gender equity in our posts. This is a reflection of the good work done by our social media team over the years and the culture we have at the Club.



Club VP Angela "Carrot" Christian-Wilkes this year completed the Change Makers Project run by Victoria Uni and Football Victoria. Thank you to Carrot's Change Maker mentor, Alana, who performed the social media data analysis.

#### **Finances**

In adopting a more club-wide approach to managing finances, it is important to ensure adequate spending on the Club's women's football programs in relation to membership fees collected from women's teams members. Below is a high level overview of spending per player by gender on core football expenses.

Spending on in-season facilities, training equipment, matchday equipment, playing gear and other clubwide operating costs are generally the same for all club members regardless of gender.

#### **Veo Sports Camera**




# Thank you to Melbourne Uni Sport for co-funding MUSC's entry into the world of video analysis!

Veo allows the club to record and analyse football matches without the need for a camera operator. The camera is set up on a 4m tripod at the half way line. It films with two 4k lenses and records 180 degrees, capturing every single moment of a match.

When a recording is uploaded to the Veo platform, software creates a video that automatically zooms and pans to follow the action on the pitch. Goals are automatically detected and tagged, making it simple to produce highlights for sharing on the club's social media channels.

Coaches can zoom and pan freely to see all players at all times to analyse the match in detail. They can create and annotate highlights, and share those to provide feedback and instructions to the entire team or individual players.

# New Life Member Madeleine Horey

Madeleine also had an exceptional playing career – with over 200 games and numerous club and varsity awards. As a goalkeeper and striker, Madeleine competed in the former Women's Premier League, many State League 1 teams and won many championships with seniors and reserves.

# Vale David Lea

Life Member David John Lea passed away peacefully in January 2021, aged 85.



David was born in England and arrived in Melbourne in 1948. He attended Melbourne High School and went on to attain numerous qualifications from the University of Melbourne: a Bachelor of Arts (1957), a DipEd (1958), a Bachelor of Education (1966) and a Master of Education (1990).

David played for the Club from 1953 to 1959, serving as Club Captain from 1956. David played his 100th game for the Club in 1958, becoming one of the first players ever to reach that milestone. David represented the University in Intervarsity competitions in the 1950s and received Half Blues in 1954 and 1955 and a Full Blue in 1957 for soccer. In 1957, David was selected in the Australian Universities Soccer Team. David's playing days came to an end when he suffered a horrific broken leg.

David was Club Secretary and Victorian Amateur Soccer Football Association Club delegate for several years in the 1950s, overseeing the formation of the club's second reserve team. David was heavily involved with student recruitment from other clubs, a process that would often involve lengthy negotiations to obtain clearance.

Away from football, David had a career as an educator. He taught in technical schools and went on to be Vice Principal and Principal at technical schools and TAFE colleges. After teaching, David turned his attention to politics and served as the member for Sandringham in the Parliament of Victoria from 1985 until he retired in 1992. In the 2000s, David made numerous trips to China as an English teacher. David was a poet of some quality, with two published volumes of poetry.

David was an unwavering supporter of the Club for 68 years and kept a strong connection to the University. David would always be one of the first to RSVP his attendance at the annual Blues Awards Dinner and thoroughly enjoyed attending Club functions to hear about the on-field exploits of the latest cohort of MUSC players. David was a popular guest, speaker and award presenter at Club functions, with younger members finding David's memories of his playing days at the Club thoroughly engaging. In recent years, David made a significant contribution to MUSC by detailing the early history of the Club. Without David providing this history, it would never have been known.

For his contributions as a player, committee member, historian, and supporter, David was awarded Life Membership of Melbourne University Soccer Club in 2020. COVID-19 restrictions meant the Club was unable to celebrate this achievement with David before he passed away, but David's family shared that soccer was one of David's many great loves and for him to be bestowed the honour of a life membership made him so happy.
